Our second port of call was Boston, USA. I had pictured Boston as a little colonial town with wood panelled houses and white churches; how wrong I was – a few hundred years late in fact! Boston today is a large, busy, modern city but there are historical signs, if you know where to look and our guide did, of significant places in the history of America and Britain.

We stood outside the church known as the birthplace of the revolution and the beginning of the War of American Independence from Britain and its taxes. (The Boston Tea Party for instance.) We later saw the balcony where the Constitution of Independence from Britain was read out.

Next day we moved to Portland, where I did find my image of New England and those houses. Two days later we sailed into New York harbour - something I've wanted to do since childhood. Dawn was just breaking and the scene was breathtaking. Then in the full daylight, I stood on deck and felt.... very small. I knew New York would be big, but it certainly has to be experienced to understand just how high the buildings rise into the sky.

We've seen it all in these past days, add in the thick fog some mornings and we've experienced quite a lot.

As storm No 3 is winding itself up outside our cabin, and the waves are beginning to get larger and stronger I'm so glad that someone is up on the bridge in control and making decisions for our safety. There are so many comparisons to our day-to-day lives, the world and its problems, the times when things go wrong and not as we planned. For the good days and the bad days it is good to know we have a Captain who will watch over us and care for us. As God said to Joshua **"Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go." Joshua 1:9**. Or as we used to sing in Sunday School. "With Christ in the vessel we can smile at the storm."
