Last Sunday I heard a thought-provoking sermon on Psalm 23 which I thought I would share with you as my reflection this week.

Psalm 23 will be well known to many of us and is probably one of the best-known passages of the bible for non-Christians as well due to it's association with the Vicar of Dibley. Our familiarity with the passage can breed, if not a contempt a sense that we already know all there is to know about the verses.

"The Lord is my shepherd, I lack nothing. He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he refreshes my soul. He guides me along the right paths for his name's sake. Even though I walk through the darkest valley, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

The focus of the sermon was on the final verse;

"Surely your goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

We do want to make sure, if we can, that the church is cleaned each week, particularly with COVID still lurking around. Also cleaning less frequently means the job is more demanding when it is done because there's more dust and dirt around. I know that most of you will feel that this would be beyond you, but is there anyone who feels they could help out with this? Please let Janet know.

I've always taken it to mean that the goodness and love of God will gently follow us around and be with us. However, the originally Hebrew is much more active in it's meaning and in other translations use chases after or pursues me instead. For me this revelation made me see this passage in a new light, God's goodness and love is not just following me but it's chasing after me wherever I go, even if I try to run away from Him.

It made me think of Jonah who sought to run away from God's will for him but God chased after him and showed his goodness and love to both Jonah in saving him but also the people of Ninevah. Orla has a book by the Good Book Company about the story of Jonah where near the end Jonah is complaining about God forgiving Ninevah and he says "I knew you would forgive them. You are a kind and loving God, and you're always ready to forgive people who turn back to you – however bad they've been." and God replies that he will forgive anyone who turns to Him, even very grumpy people like Jonah!

God's goodness and love is chasing after us, ready to embrace us when we turn to him. We can see the examples of this in Jesus' earthly ministry where Jesus seeks out specifically the Samaritan woman in John 4 and Zacchaeus in Luke 19. Jesus is the Good Shepherd and he seeks us out, asks us to turn to him.
